

FFQ Key Design Standards for Quality Environments

These are the key design elements for quality early learning environments that are requirements of the Fund for Quality (FFQ) program. During the FFQ Planning Phase, we work with you to understand your ability to meet these goals.

This is not an exhaustive list. The <u>FFQ Child Care Center Design Guide</u>, <u>FFQ Child Care Center Design Guide</u> for <u>All</u>, and program consultants are all great resources for many detailed design considerations when planning for quality early learning environments.

KEY DESIGN STANDARDS

For Classrooms:

*Full height walls between classrooms

Can include open viewing window for additional light and supervision. **Reason:** Language learning and noise <u>Design Guide for All p. 20</u>

*Sinks in classrooms

At least one sink per classroom. Ideal is 1 adult height and 2 child height sinks per classroom. **Reason:** Health and supervision/transitions <u>Design Guide p. 34</u>

*Bathrooms in classrooms

Bathrooms in every classroom for preschool and toddlers. **Reason:** Health and supervision/transitions <u>Design Guide p. 34 and p. 44</u>

*Ideal classroom sizes

Sized to offer maximum ratios/group sizes (with square footage buffer for quality and licensing). Ideal room sizes include two teachers in each classroom. **Reason:** Financial sustainability <u>Design Guide p. 16</u>

For Program Spaces:

*Ample gross motor space

Ideally both outdoor and indoor gross motor space, adequate for at least one classroom.

*Staff space and dedicated staff bathroom

Adequate, comfortable and quiet.

SPRINKLER STANDARD

FFQ requires childcare providers to follow <u>Philadelphia Building Code (IBC 2018) sprinkler requirements</u> and provider sprinklers on any floor that does not exit directly to grade. FFQ requires sprinklers on any second floor, basement, or first floor where children are served if there is not a direct exit to grade in all cases, including if building permits could be issued without requiring a new Certificate of Occupancy.

In addition to meeting all <u>DHS childcare licensing</u>, <u>Philadelphia Building Code 2018</u>, and other regulatory requirements, all projects must pass review by a third-party construction inspector.
